Hugh O'Conor Memorial Pipe Band – Arizona become Affiliate Members of the IPBA

As pipe bands go, Hugh O'Conor Memorial Pipe Band is a young band. Founded in 2006 by Neal Flint and two friends over dinner and drinks or drinks and dinner. In any event, it wasn't long before the band had a dozen members, new drums and individually ourchased uniforms.

First uniforms were pretty simple, green kilts, black vests, white hose, black leather sporrans and black glengarries. It was a Tucson, AZ band on a very strict budget and as Neal Flint once said, "not in a piping Mecca." It is situated in the southern part of the state at least 100 miles from any other pipe band. Training new players and building corps had its difficulties

By 2010, though, the band had grown to 14 pipes, 5 sides and 3 mid-section players and was competing successfully in Arizona and Nevada

Right from the start the goal was to take the band to compete in the All Ireland Pipe Band Championships. As with any pipe band, we have had our share of highs and lows. We have had the pleasure of winning both Grade IV contests in the Flagstaff Celtic Festival, Flagstaff, Arizona and over time saw good players come and go. Currently, we are seeing an increase in our membership, with many old members coming back to the band and adding a few new players. It now looks like we are going to fulfil our dream of competing in the All Ireland, in Ballymena this year.

You might wonder who Hugh O'Conor was and why the band is named in his honor. In 1750, 16-year-old Hugh O'Conor was sent to live with his cousin, Alexander O'Reilly, an officer in the Regimente de Hibernia, the Irish regiment in the army of the King of Spain. Once there, O'Reilly was able to acquire a cadet officer's position in the regiment for Hugh.

O'Conor fought in Portugal, later Cuba and was assigned to the protection of New Spain (Mexico). His job was to build presidios (forts) for the protection from Comanches and Apache. There was also the perceived threat of invasion by Russia. One of these presidios was San Agustin de Taixon, today's Tucson. Arizona.

We are proud to honor Hugh O'Conor, the founder of Tucson, one of the first cities in Arizona. The current pipe major is Leonard Wood and drum sergeant is Kyle Reich. While we did lose the white hose, (now charcoal grey) we are still wearing green kilts, black vests, sporrans, and glengarries.

A sincere thanks to all the Participating Bands and Groups.



The South of Ireland Pipe Band Gathering & Championships 2023 was staged in the grounds of Mallow Castle, Co Corkon Saturday 27th May and was adjudged a success.

Eight bands participated in the event, namely, Youghal, Ballingeary, Killeshin, Carrigaline, City of Limerick, Newcastle West, New Ross & District and Thos Davis Mallow.

The Chieftain of the Day was local personage Eugene Cosgrove.

After the competitive section ended bands got a 'second run' in a noncompetitive element which was essentially a mini-concert, a 'Band Performance'. Bands could take up any formation, there was no need to march, anything could be played.

Short breaks between music segments were permitted, solo, drum corps or any group elements could be performed, the inclusion of other instrumentation was encouraged with the only regulation being a minimum of five minutes playing time to a maximum of fifteen minutes.

Bands obviously enjoyed the noncompetitive informality, with many planning ahead for future performances.

Fantastic weather and good company, a great time was had by all.




























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Late Start for Pipe Band Contest in 1933

On Tuesday evening 6th June 1933 the NACA Carnival Pipe Band Contest was held at the Carnival Esplanade.

The bands assembled at Smithfield at 8.00 pm and marched to the grounds at five-minute intervals from 8.15 pm. The attendance numbered 2000.

The adjudicators were Supt D J Delaney, Musical Director of the Garda Síochana and Rev Thomas O'Donoghue (what, if any, pipe band knowledge they had is unknown). Marching and appearance counted as much as playing ability.

Finton Lalors and Palmerstown tied for first place and were recalled for a playoff.

Bands present were St Anthony of Padua (CBSI Merchant's Quay), Finton Lalors, Black Raven (Lusk), Donnybrook CBS, St Mary's (Congress), Palmerstown, St Dymphnas.

Results: 1st Fintan Lalor (82), 2nd Palmerstown (81), 3rd Donnybrook CBSI (72), 4th Black Raven (71)

An Tostal

The government of the Republic of Ireland, anxious to promote tourism, sponsored a series of festivals throughout the country during the 1950s called An Tóstal (The Gathering). Inaugurated in 1953, these festivals continued on until 1958 when they died out in most centres.


The original purpose of an Tostal was a celebration of Irish life and culture, with an emphasis upon drawing tourists into the country during the Easter off-season. The festival was marked by a series of regional parades, arts, sporting and cultural events. Pipe Band contests and pageants formed a significant part of these celebrations and were all marked by the inclusion of ancillary events such as parades, dancing exhibitions, tug o war contests etc.

In 1953 a Tostal Pipe Band Contest was held in the Iveagh Gardens on 18th April 1953. This contest is notable for presence of a group of Breton pipers, singers and dancers led by Polig Monjarret. They were received by Senator Clarkin and Chief Justice Conor Maguire. (Chairman of the Irish Branch of Celtic Congress). An Tostal Pipe Band Contests were held in many locations in the country.

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Early Compilations of Irish Music for the Bagpipe

Among the earliest and most influential was the 1911 collection of Irish Tunes for the Scottish and Irish War-Pipes.

This compilation was by William Walsh and arranged and published in Edinburgh by David Glen 1911.

William Walsh, a flute player and dancer as well as a warpiper, and an Irish speaker, was born in 1859 in Oughterard, Co Galway, and was brought to America as a child. Settled in Chicago, he was attracted to the sound of the warpipes, and sought out the company of Scottish players there. He joined the police force in the city in 1891, and was a friend of the music collector Francis O'Neill who was prominent in the force.

Walsh was self-taught in music and learned from notation in preference to ear, and his collection of Irish and Scottish tunes for the instrument was in manuscript by 1909.

David Glen one of a prominent family of musical instrument makers and music publishers which had been in business in Edinburgh since the 1820s, added characteristic grace notes to Walsh's notations. The collection was later reprinted by Glen in a 2/6 edition, and reprinted by Mozart Allan in Glasgow in 1951.

Irish Airs for the Warpipes

Arranged and edited by Lt Orpen Palmer 1913


Geoffrey de Montmorency Herbert Orpen Palmer was the son of the biblical scholar Rev Abraham, of Killowen, Kenmare, Co Kerry. Both he and his brother joined the army and were Battalion Commanders during the Great War. G. de M. H. Orpen-Palmer rose to the rank of Lt Col.

He arranged and edited Irish Airs for the War Pipes, published by Butlers of Dublin in January 1913.

Both he and his brother were known affectionally as OP1 and OP2.


Irish Airs for the Warpipes also contained a 'tutor' section.

Lt Orpen Palmer, as he was in 1913 was attached to the Prince of Wales Leinster Regiment, the geographical hinterland for which was Longford, Meath, West Meath, King and Queen's Counties (Laois and Offally) – his connection to piping is unknown.

Irish Warpipe Tutor and Tune Book

Written by Bill Andrews in 1924

Foreword by Francis Joseph Biggar, Preface by Liam Mac Andrieu. Published by (1st Ed)Mc. Cullough's Dublin and Belfast, 1924 McCullough's Irish Warpipe Tutor and Tune Book was compiled by Liam Andrews.

He taught the uilleann and warpipes was instrumental in founding the Dublin Pipers' Club Pipe Band. He is recorded as the instructor for the Club's regular piping classes in 1908 and we also know that pipers of other bands then forming throughout Dublin sought his expert instruction.

Andrews was a prolific writer on the subject of piping and received his instruction from Pipe Major Willie Gray of the Glasgow Police. He also wrote articles for 'Piping and Dancing' Magazine under the pseudonym 'Slainte'. He was also involved in the production of pipes for McCulloghs.

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Washed Out

Pipe Fest Tralee 2023

This event took place on Saturday 17th June in association with Tralee Town Park Garden Festival 2023 (Feile na mBláth).

The concept of Pipe Fest was to get bands together in a non-competitive environment and deliver a performance. The performance could be undertaken in any formation, with combinations of solo, group, whole band elements, alternative instruments were also welcome.

It was hoped that players from different bands could also come together to play a few tunes in a 'Get Together' session.

Seven bands attended, Tralee Development Band, Cullen, New Ross & District, City of Limerick, Killorglin & District, Tralee Pipes & Drums and Newcastle West & District.

To finish the programme a 'massed-band' parade from the Denny Street to the Mall was planned where a Finalé would be conducted.

With the first performance of the day almost complete the heavens opened up and the programme had to be abandoned, however some nice jamming sessions took place in a marquee, saving the day somewhat.
